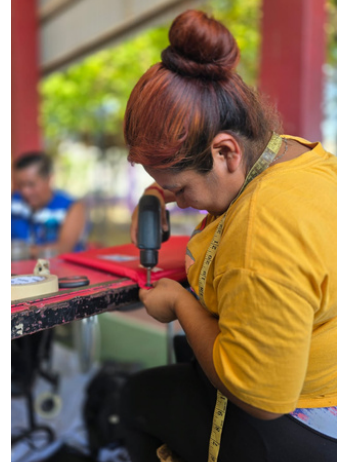
ALEM gives mobility. Affordable wheelchair repairs are made by staff who are themselves using wheelchairs. A friend of Karitas says: “That which you appreciate grows.” This is so true of ALEM, which grew exponentially this past year.

In partnership with Hope Haven West, we began to assemble specialty wheelchairs for children with paralysis. Our ALEM team assists them during the seating clinics in Mexico and other countries. In addition to the **3,000-plus wheelchairs we repaired**, we have helped Hope Haven fit wheelchairs for more than **500 children**.

Our new branch in Mexico City, which opened two years ago, hosts many wheelchair repair clinics, strengthening our connection with supportive local Rotary clubs. It builds capacity to do the increasing load of wheelchair repair work we are taking on.

Partnership with Rotary has exponentially impacted our ability to expand ALEM. The Rotary club in San Luis Potosi hopes to start a branch. San Luis Potosi is located halfway between the U.S. border and Cuernavaca. If they serve the same radius, we will soon cover a corridor 500 miles wide and over 1,000 miles north to south.

As the Karitas methodology spreads, we cultivate amazing young leaders while autonomous spin-offs guarantee ongoing impact. This means: **more people served, more people mobile, more people active and productive in their communities... and more need for parts!** We need your financial partnership more than ever.



The community of La Estación (“the station”) is located where the train station used to be, close to downtown Cuernavaca. Many years ago, the abandoned rail lines became a place for people fleeing violence and economic hardship from the south. Today it has a population of over 10,000.

For almost 25 years, we have been supporting a community center, breakfast program, and preschool there. The center serves 160 breakfasts each day to the children and elderly. The children attend the preschool, and dozens of parents are involved in skill trainings offered at the center. A teacher from the local public elementary school notes that the children coming from our preschool program are well above average.

A recent workshop focused on the idea of self-care. We planned it thinking of the struggles people living in poverty have to endure — insecurity in every way, from getting food on the table, to access to medical attention, to an environment prone to violence. Halfway through the session, an older woman in the group, Doña Brenda, spoke up. “I think when you are poor you have more joy. Here we are together with our families and also with our neighbors. We wouldn’t be able to survive if we weren’t.”

Her words changed our conversation. We all are looking for community, meaning, purpose, and transcendence. There are many stories of struggle and tragedy that are part of our accompaniment of the residents of La Estación.

Yet they carry a particular light for us. We are honored that they have embraced Karitas as part of their resilient community.

Education Initiative

The Education Initiative we designed and operate collaboratively with two other groups continues to be incredibly successful. Our two partners are La Jugarreta (working in the mountains of Tepoztlán) and Caminando Unidos (working along the poverty belt of the defunct railroad line in the city of Cuernavaca) — two completely different contexts. Though we only support the kids through middle school, almost all of the program’s first generation has continued on to high school by their own initiative. Close to half have gone on to college. This would have been unimaginable in their environments.

The success has been noticed. Other players have come onboard to increase the number of kids the program can accommodate. In Tepoztlán they have added an additional 10 kids with other funding.

This is a big deal. When we create prototypes that are successful, others are inspired to join us. The impact expands. Every child you help us pull out of the cycle of poverty and into a prosperous and fulfilling future sparks the possibility for another. Some of the former students, now college graduates, are talking of how they will give back. Your gifts spread the circle wider.





Safe School Water

The Rotary Foundation has approved funding for a fourth safe school water project. It will provide water to one of the most vulnerable populations in Mexico — migrant farm laborers and their families.

Yancuic Yotlanes is a multi-grade public school established for the families of farm laborers. Most have fled the economic hardship and violence in southern Mexico to cut sugar cane in Morelos. The families live in “stalls” that the sugar cane producers provide them right next door to the school. This water project we promoted will provide safe drinking water for the children in the school as well as their families. It will also offer training in sanitation and hygiene. Ways to Give

Gets one person mobile and in their wheelchair, employs our wheel-chair bound technicians.

Supports a middle-school student through our Education Initiative programming, including a small stipend, tutoring, counseling, field trips, and after-school workshops.

Gives ten children in La Estación meals and tuition—and a different future as part of their community.

\$35,000

Installs a rainwater harvest station: collection, storage, purification in a rural public school and its surrounding community. Karitas trains them to maintain it.

\$70,000

Launches a new wheelchair repair shop, including training for a new team of technicians with disabilities and a stock of wheelchair parts for a year. People employed, people mobile, people contributing to their family and community.
